TOWER TIDINGS

The Sixty-Second Epistle of John: "The Lenten Teeter-Totter"

The approach of Lent always puts me in a ponderous mind frame. There's a weight to this season which is unique and by design — confession, repentance, a higher degree of honesty about ourselves, fasting, ashes, and darkness all come together in the attempt to move one deeper into the true self as it also tries to move us all closer to the divine. But the approach is tenuous, the steps taken are shaky; we find no real reinforcement for this journey in greater society, where most effort is put into the messages of self-sufficiency and "I'm OK, you're OK" ideology. Most of us do not find it natural to consider our limitations and fallibility; we hate to be wrong about anything, especially ourselves.

And yet, there are quite a few who dwell too long in such lands, where a sense of one's self-value is decimated, where neglect or attack or diminishment by others is a regular affair. The withering effect of such treatment can become normalized in one's life; hear the message "you're no good" too often, from external sources or from internal, and one begins to believe this horrible untruth.

I have found that Lent is actually a dangerous time for these reasons — as it seeks to purify and confess, it can lead to damage in self-perception and esteem. I meet with too many people who doubt their lovability, who question their value in many ways, helped along by a cold and heartless environment at home, or at school, or at work, or generally in the world.

This is why I believe that the most important element in this season is not confession, nor honesty about self, nor repentance or fasting or redemption; I believe that the most important element in Lent is balance. Let me explain what I mean......

The things of Lent which do damage (and I'm borrowing form from Dietrich Bonhoeffer's The Cost of Discipleship here) are

Confession without pardon

Redemption without transformation

Honesty without confirmation

Fasting without devotion

Humility without affirmation

Prayer without listening.

Repentance without change

In contrast, Lent serves much more of its purpose when it accompanies the gravitas of sorrow and self-abasement with the consistent response of grace-involved value. Key to this response is to center on grace as God's gift rather than any measurable externality; one thing the world can never consistently provide is the inner peace of knowing one's profound, eternal value which is at the heart of the Lenten emphasis. Lent exists not to bring a spirit down, but to bring that spirit to life by removing the need to be encumbered by self-loathing or any sense of worthlessness. The world is good at reinforcing such messages; faith is essential to countering their effect.

If you know me, you know I am a creature of visuals; I find that images and pictures can help bring forth messages of value that go beyond words. In this vein, I have often thought of the visual for Lent being a teeter-totter, the variety found on school playgrounds the world over. A teeter-totter only works if there is an interplaying balance between the sides; balance itself is not the end goal so much as interaction between two opposite entities; the fun is in consistently correcting imbalances. Perhaps this is a good way to think of not only our Lenten journey, but our faith journey overall; to consistently correct our spiritual imbalances at the invitation of a fulcrum God?

Tzedakah Pocket Offers Hope

2023 continues to be a challenge for us with so many requests for assistance coming our way. The assistance requests we have received so far have been expensive ones. It's still early in the year so funding is still available from other sources and the housing market is still depressed so we see little call for "Rent/Deposit" assistance right now. "Lodging" requests are intermittent and the "Lodging" requests we have received so far this year have been weather and illness related. Our "Other" category is where we have seen the largest number of requests. These include payment of storage unit rents so people don't lose all their possessions while they try to find housing, payment for car repairs for those living in their cars, settling outstanding debts so applying for housing is possible, a bus ticket for a young man trying to get home to family, buying gas/gift cards, etc. We can't predict when we will get assistance requests or how much will be needed to satisfy each request but we are here to

Green Notes: Solar Power! Energy Conservation! Recycling!

 In what could be the surest sign that spring is on the way, First UMC's solar panels are once again generating electricity. The sun is out, the power switches are "on," and all systems are go.
 As we move into the sunniest months of the year, we will be able to see just how much power



our installation can produce. SBS Solar believes the 66 panels atop the Education Annex roof can supply 80% of our church's electricity.

- Just as our solar installation went on line last fall, NorthWestern Energy increased electric
 rates by 12.5%. That means we need your help to keep First Church's power bills down by
 conserving electricity wherever and whenever possible. Make sure the lights are off when
 you leave a room or hallway. Don't leave outside doors open, letting in the cold air. Unplug
 appliances when they're not being used. And help us look for more ways to conserve.
 Every kilowatt helps!
- A hearty welcome to Joanna Duran, the newest member of First Church's composting and glass recycling program. Joanna and her husband recently moved to Missoula; already, she plays in First UMC's handbell choir. And now, the Durans are one of about 50 families participating in our glass and composting efforts. You can join, too! The cost is just \$5 per month. - The Missoula City Council needs your support in its fight to regain the local control needed to regulate single-use plastics. Why is this important? Because plastics are overrunning our planet: Filling up landfills. (Did you know the Missoula landfill will cut into more ground in the North Hills in the next few years?)
