The Seventy-First Epistle of John - "Reversing the Question"

I wonder what this new year will bring into my life? And into yours?

Much of the same as last year, I would predict. Many of the same worries, fears, anxieties, frustrations, and disorienting realities that made the year something we'd rather not repeat. But, upon deeper reflection, there were many more, less obvious graces and blessings that occurred – my grandchildren being introduced to new wonders and sharing their spontaneous joy that fills our hearts; the guiet kindnesses I see in so very many people around me, from a handshake to a smile to a supportive word; justice advocates working tirelessly to correct society's brokenness; the beauty of changing seasons and cloud-accented sunsets and snow-clarified air; the individual conversations where something of the heart is shared through tears and laughter, to the encouragement of us both. So very much good occurred but in quieter, less amplified ways, which is perhaps the very nature of goodness – unwilling to pronounce its presence for fear of a lesser motivation (read, pride).

It is the mark of good beginnings to start in such ways, reflecting upon the challenges of the past but not forsaking the more subtle but ample blessings that may pass by relatively unnoticed. Such attentions can help us do more effectively what all humans do at the turning points of life — **consider what is coming.** It is, though, only a starting point for moving into what shall be; the past confines us to the facts of our experiences and the turnings of matters beyond our control or even our understanding. They may provide us with a template for future possibilities but give us no guarantee that those guidelines will be followed.

Looking towards the future may thus seem like a fruitless enterprise where fate rules all; but fate does not rule all, at least in any life that has felt its effect upon its context. This is the basic premise of our faith, where we understand that **we are not**

We each have so many parts to play in so many aspects of God's handiwork, invited to lend our efforts to worthy causes and meaningful community and creation's stewardship....the list is long of things we are asked to consider for the positive movement of life, ours and others, towards a better tomorrow.

It is for these reasons that there is a much more important question that should be raised anytime we feel the effects of time's transition, a question we don't find as spontaneous perhaps, but a question God places before us as co-investors in creation, namely:

I wonder what I may bring into this new year?

I wonder what good I might do for others, what blessing I might bring to the world, what help I may offer in ways I've not done before? I wonder about intentionally changing my attitude towards others who are not like me or do not share my opinion? I wonder how I may check my automatic judgement mechanism and give more benefits-of-a-doubt? I wonder how I might apply more automatic grace to those who cut me off in traffic, or send me hostile emails, or dump leaves from their yard into mine while they think I'm not looking (and, yes, this happened!)?

Every beginning is an invitation to hope for better things to come, but invitations are seldom helpful unless one gives an intentional response. And the response to hope that leads to life requires investment. We may hope that the world improves, and we are invited to consider what such improvement looks like, but consideration alone will never create a better tomorrow; it is what we bring into the world – and what inspires what we bring – that makes hope real.

Viktor Frankl – whom I consider one of my historical mentors – was a survivor of the concentration camps of World War II. Of that experience, he had this to say regarding what he learned: "It did not really matter what we expected from life, but rather **what life expected from us.** We needed to stop asking about the meaning of life, and instead to think of ourselves as those who were being questioned by life—daily and hourly. Our answer must consist, not in talk and meditation, but in right action and in right conduct. Life ultimately means taking the responsibility to find the right answer to its problems and to fulfill the tasks which it constantly sets for each individual." (Viktor E. Frankl, <u>Man's Search for Meaning</u>).

After all, isn't what we bring into this next year what largely determines what we will experience in our lives?



The continuing pandemic, inflation, and the fallout from them continue to increase the need for donations to the Food Bank. They also make it a challenge for us to do our January Food Drive but we have always come through and supported our community. We are offering

you as many donation options as we possibly can under the circumstances. If you are able, please help us do our part to ensure food security for households in our community. Whatever option you choose, please make your donations of food and/or funds sometime during January.

Option 1: Use the 2024 Food-by-the-Case Order Form to order a case of food through the Orange Street Market. The Case Order Form will be distributed as soon as we have the information. Most needed items will be identified by the Food Bank and will be shown on the form with the current price per case. The completed form and your check can be mailed to Missoula First UMC, P.O. Box 7646, Missoula MT 59807 or dropped off at the office during office hours (9-12; Monday-Thursday). Please make your check out to First UMC and put "Food Bank" in the memo line. The office will have extra forms if you need them as well.

Option 2: Make a monetary donation and let the Food Bank buy what they need at wholesale prices. Donations can be mailed to Missoula First UMC, P.O. Box 7646, Missoula MT 59807 or dropped off at the office during office hours (9-12; Monday -Thursday). You can also give online. If you mail a check, please make your check to First UMC and put "Food Bank" in the memo line. For online donations, please select the "Missoula food bank" option from the designated giving options.

Option 3: Place your food donations in the container located outside the church office. If you are not able to enter the church, you may either buzz the office during office hours when you are at the back door or call the office (549-6118) during office hours for entry to make your donation. Office hours are Monday through Thursday from 9 to 12.

Our Sunday School will assemble the birthday Kits for us from your donations. They will need cake mixes, frosting, candles, cake decorations, party plates/napkins, plastic forks, gift bags, and tin foil pans. Place your donation items in the "birthday-wrapped" container outside the office. As you can imagine, the Birthday Kits are very popular at the Food Bank.

Mushrooms

Egg Shells

Plant and Flower Trimmings Shredded Paper (not glossy)

Please Avoid:

Meat & Fish

Dairy Products

Produce Stickers, twist ties, rubber bands

Eggs (egg shells are no problem)

Excessive Grease, Oil, Fats

Plastic, Glass, and Metal

Pet Waste or Litter





We hope that added incentive brings

even more First Church families to the glass recycling and composting effort, as both are excellent programs that keep material out of Missoula's landfill and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The glass and compost bins are conveniently located along the alley in the backyard of the Missoula Symphony Office, next door to the church. Please be sure to only place glass in the large glass bins, and allowable compost items in the smaller compost bin. A graphic accompanying this article shows what items can and cannot be composted.

Glass to be recycled needs to be clean, but can be any color, shape or size. Please remove any lids or corks. If participation increases, we can easily add more glass bins. And remember: Glass is a great way to replace the use of non-recyclable plastic containers. All glass can be recycled and reused.



The compost we collect also is reused, creating new, healthy soil that is used locally.

Thank you to the 50-plus First Church families who made this program such a success. Now let's add the next 50 families – and take a six-month vacation from fees. Happy 2024!
