TAKE ACTION to Reduce Plastic!

The Sunday April 14 "Green Minute" mentioned three Actions we can take to advocate for reduced plastic pollution in our



environment. Here they are, again with the "links" for the two you can do on line.

ONE: Support the **REDUCE Act.** [Rewarding Efforts to Decrease Unrecycled Contaminants in Ecosystems (REDUCE) Act (H.R. 5564/S. 2844)] This is a bill that would put a fee on the sale of new, virgin plastic resin used to make single-use products, shifting industries to use recycled plastics or alternatives when creating single-use products as well as funding plastic waste reduction and recycling projects. You can personalize a sample letter and submit it through the *Creation Justice Ministries* website. Look for the "April 2024 Action" button: https://www.creationjustice.org/action.html.

TWO: Advocate for the U.S. government to sign onto the U.N. Environment Assembly resolution to end plastic pollution and create the world's first global plastic pollution treaty by the end of this year. WWF Action Center link to sign the petition in support of the treaty: https://www.worldwildlife.org/pages/action-center **THREE**: Look for an opportunity to tell your State Senator (or candidate for that office) and your candidate for State Representative that you want a State ban on plastic bags.

Green Notes: Plastic Recycling Is 'Wishcycling'

Plastic bags are not recyclable. They wind up in the trash, even if you put them in a recycling bin. The solution: Don't use them in the first place!

In a recent test, ABC News put dozens of trackers in plastic bags, then put the bags in alleged recycling bins. Many of the bags wound up in landfills.

One tracker dropped off at a New York Walmart later pinged in Indonesia; trackers dropped off at a "recycling bin" in Florida and another in Kansas last pinged in Malaysia – places struggling with plastic waste imports from around the world.



"It's the Wild West of exporting plastics, and it's causing real damage, particularly in Indonesia and Malaysia and other countries that have not entirely closed their doors to plastic imports," ABC News reported.

In all, only four of ABC's trackers ended up at U.S. facilities that say they are involved with recycling plastic bags. Less than 10 percent of plastic waste is recycled worldwide, data shows.

As the plastics industry continues to expand, dozens of experts and industry insiders told ABC's reporters that the current plastic recycling system does not work.

"We cannot recycle our way out of the plastic pollution crisis," one industry insider said, stressing the need for restrictions on plastic production and use. Consumers can help by eliminating their personal use of single-use plastic bags.

There are easy grocery store swap-outs that take plastic out of the picture:

In the produce department, skip the plastic produce bags. This is one of the simplest swap-outs you can make. You don't need bags for fruits and vegetables. Also, buy loose carrots, potatoes and onions rather than the pre-bagged options.

Choose cardboard egg cartons, not plastic or Styrofoam. You can put cardboard cartons in the recycle bin or repurpose them as seed starters for the garden or DIY fire starters.

At the deli counter, bring your own containers and skip the plastic bags and cups. If you're buying a cut of meat that is sold both at the butcher counter and in pre-packaged portions, opt for the former. Again, bring your own re-usable containers.

Do not buy food packaged in black plastic trays (often found in the prepackaged meat department). They are not recyclable. Anywhere. Putting black plastic in recycling bins is "wishcycling."

If your store has a bulk aisle, shop there for staples like rice, grains, nuts and pasta. Bring your own containers.

Kick the bottled water habit. Just do it. We have perfectly drinkable tap water in Missoula and most of the U.S.

When you shop for spices, sauces and condiments, hunt for glass containers. Glass is infinitely recyclable and reusable. And we have free glass recycling in bins at Missoula First UMC!
